

Meet the chief

On April 9, Landy Black was sworn in as Davis' 10th police chief. Black is a 24-year law-enforcement veteran who was hired in February following an eight-month nationwide search. Formerly Black was a captain with the Seattle Police Department where he served as commander of the city's diverse East Precinct.

Black graduated from the University of Washington with a B.A. in Business Administration. He earned his Master of Public Administration degree in Justice Administration from Troy University. He has also earned Middle Management and Executive Leadership Certificates from the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission.

The new chief has pledged to work with the community and the department's officers to keep Davis a "safe and livable community."

City pools: Behind the scenes

During the summer months, while many residents are still sleeping, the city of Davis pool complexes—Arroyo, Civic, and Community—are being maintained. Pool maintenance begins as early as 4:00 a.m. during the summer to ensure that pools are clean, safe and ready for the active hot weather use. The Manor Pool complex in Slide Hill Park is currently being renovated and will reopen for public use in 2008.

Daily pool maintenance includes safety checks, measuring chemical levels, vacuuming each pool, cleaning bathrooms, decks and pool strainers, and performing landscape maintenance. Pool maintenance requires monitoring of many technical components of the pools. Clean, safe water is maintained, in part, by the use of chemical controllers that continuously monitor and adjust the chlorine and pH levels.

Did you Know...

- City pool complexes contain eleven individual pools?
- City pools contain 1,092,000 gallons of water?
- City pools create 30,000 square feet of pool surface?
- City pools are surrounded by 75,000 square feet of deck?
- City pools are trimmed with 1,800 lineal feet of pool tile—that's a lot of tile to clean!

To register, click on "Register" at: www.cityofdavis.org/pcs/webreg and renew the swim pass from home. If you have already set up your household online account to take advantage of other activity or class registration, just log on, click "Shop" and "Pass Renewal" to renew each member's key fob which is accepted as your swim pass.

If you need to set up an online account, give us a call during business hours, Monday through Friday between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. If you didn't save your fob, you can purchase a new pass at Arroyo Pool beginning April 28, 2007.

May 2007 is Older Americans Month

When Older Americans Month was established in 1963, only 17 million living Americans had reached their 65th birthdays. About a third of older Americans lived in poverty and there were few programs to meet their needs. In April of 1963, President John F. Kennedy's meeting with the National Council of Senior Citizens served as a prelude to designating May as "Senior Citizens Month." Thanks to President Jimmy Carter's designation, what was once called Senior Citizens Month is now called "Older Americans Month," and has become an annual tradition.

Historically, Older Americans Month has been a time to acknowledge the contributions of past and current older persons to our country, in particular those who defended our country. Every President since JFK has issued a formal proclamation during or before the month of May asking that the entire nation should pay tribute in some way to older persons in their communities. Older Americans Month is celebrated across the country

through ceremonies, events, fairs, and other such activities.
