Over the last 5 years, arrests and criminal citations issued to juveniles have decreased by 66%. The biggest decrease occurred between 2017 and 2018, during which the Davis Police Department fully implemented the Juvenile Restorative Justice Program. It was also during this time that the Department allocated significant resources into alternative outreach and programming to include: family engagement, early interventions, crime prevention, and student safety (see Youth Services Strategic Plan).
